Provost: Site bad as tool of research

More than 80 percent of college students use Wikipedia as a research tool, according to a report released by the University of Washington.

The report detailed a survey of more than 2,300 students, many of whom said they used Wikipedia as a starting point for course-related research papers. According to the study, nearly 90 percent of the students polled said they also use the online encyclopedia for non-courserelated research.

Wikipedia is a free online encyclopedia that is easily edited and stores millions of pages devoted to various topics with more than 3 million published pages in English.

Provost Nowell Donovan said the site should not be used for research papers because many Wikipedia articles are not well-written, and may include incorrect information because the site could be edited easily by anyone with an internet connection. He said that if at any point a student were to take information from Wikipedia, or any other source, and use it in his or her paper without citing the source, the student would have plagiarized that work. Donovan said he could not say whether there was any correlation between Wikipedia users and those who plagiarize because he had not se any data outlining a connection be-

Trevor Baham, a freshman political science major, said he uses the site about once a week because it is a quick and easy way to look up information, and



Books still best, but Wikipedia progressing

tudents hear it all the time when preparing to write academic papers: "Wikipedia is not a source!" But don't count Wikipedia out completely.

The online encyclopedia can be easily edited, which makes the credibility of the information questionable. Therefore, it's perfectly understandable that it should not be cited as a primary source for any research paper.

But the site is a good place to go for a basic overview of information on a certain topic of interest. Some entries lead to other more reliable sources for more detailed information. Wikipedia has also created a monitoring system for some controversial topics through which entries are screened for accuracy. If the information is false, the post is taken down. While this does create a higher level of credibility, users should realize there's a lag between when an entry is posted and when it is checked for accuracy, and Wikipedia is still not reliable enough to be used for academic research.

While the Internet age has made researching astronomically easier, when working on an academic paper, the library is always one's friend. While it may be the more time consuming and "old school" option, books often hold more details than other types of sources. Furthermore, academic databases have electronic versions of books on seemingly every topic imaginable.

Sexual abuse cases result of men's sins, not church's fault

Don't get me wrong. I am aware that plenty of opposition toward the Catholic Church exists on a variety of different topics. But the one that receives the most attention from anti-Catholic antagonists is the issue of sexual abuse that seems to be running unchecked in the church today.

Earlier this month, Pope Benedict XVI issued a pastoral letter to the church in Ireland apologizing to victims of sexual abuse at the hand of clergy. However, this letter was met with skepticism and anger by many Catholics and for good reason.

The reality is that there seems to be contradicting Vatican ethics in addressing this issue. For many, the direct and seemingly sincere apology is unprecedented in scope. In addition, the apology and resolve to move forward with the current leadership embodies the forgiveness and strength to grow in holiness taught by Jesus and handed down to the church.

However, while one of my favorite things about the faith is its stance on forgiveness and the dignity of every person, something must be done. Sexual abuse is an apparent violation of canon law and the vows that members of the clergy have taken.

As a result, frustration has arisen from the seemingly wish-washy stance taken by the Vatican on this extremely momentous issue. Many victims are angry, and many have abandoned their faith. Action must be taken.

The pope is correct in a sense – it is paramount that the first step be that these clergy members are forgiven of their past actions.


However, even when forgiveness is bestowed, there are still consequences, much as a child who throws a baseball through his neighbor's window is forgiven, but is still forced to repair the damage. Even if these clergy members are truly contrite for their sins, they need to undergo a period of penance.


The issue here transcends the specifics of this particular case. It should be noted that this issue is not one of faith, but more of administrative responsibility within the church, beginning with the pope. It is a fact that the church is run by men, intrinsically sinful beings. Just because we don't get it exactly right pletely abandon Christianity altogether. If one has a bad professor at a university, that is no excuse for immediately dropping out and rejecting one's beliefs in education. In much the same way, an experience with a sinful church leader should not detract from the truth of Christ and the many wonderful things the Catholic Church has to offer.

The pope should take a strong stance and temporarily suspend those clergy suspected or convicted of sexual abuse until either an investigation is conducted or those individuals are healed.

The purpose of the presbyterate, the priesthood in general, is to nourish and build up the church, a mission that is not being fulfilled amidst all these distractions. With a strong stance on the issue and the appropriate actions, lives can begin to be healed and church officials can return to fulfilling their mission.

Punishment for teenagers guilty of 'sexting' needs to be relaxed



In most states, teenagers younger than 18 can be punished with serious consequences, including being charged with felony production of child pornography and having to register as a sex offender, for "sexting" to other teenagers. Sexting is identified as sending risque messages or photos of themselves via computer or cell phone. According to The New York Times article "Rethinking Sex Offender Laws for Youth Texting," lawyers and legislators in various states are now trying to lessen the punishment for teenagers guilty of sexting, and I agree with them 100 percent.

Teenagers who distribute sexual children who fall victim to child photos of themselves shouldn't have to face the same punishment as older individuals, like 45-year-old child predators. Twin suicide bombings kill 38 in Moscow subway

MOSCOW (AP) — Terror returned to the heart of Russia, with two deadly suicide bombings on the Moscow subway at rush hour, including an attack at the station beneath the headquarters of the secret police.

At least 38 people were killed and more than 60 wounded in Monday morning's blasts.

Russian police have killed several Islamic militant leaders in the North Caucasus recently, which raised fears of retaliatory strikes and escalating bloodshed by the militants.

The bombings showed that the beleaguered rebels are still strong enough to inflict harm on an increasingly assertive Russia, and they followed a warning last month from Chechen rebel leader Doku Umarov that "the war is coming to their cities."

S. Korean defense minister: Warship may have struck mine

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — A naval mine dispatched from North Korea may have struck the South Korean warship that exploded and sank near the Koreas' disputed sea border, the defense minister told lawmakers Monday.

Defense Minister Kim Tae-young said there was no sign of a direct attack from North Korea, but military authorities have not ruled out North Korean involvement in the sinking of the Cheonan late Friday night.

An explosion ripped the 1,200ton ship apart during a routine patrol mission near Baengnyeong Island. Fifty-eight crew members, including the captain, were plucked to safety; 46 remain missing.

The Joint Chiefs of Staff said the exact cause would remain unclear until the ship is salvaged after the rescue operation is over.

Superman comic sells for \$1.5M, setting record

NEW YORK (AP) — The record price for a comic book, already broken twice this year, has been shattered again.

A copy of the 1938 edition of Action Comics No. 1 sold Monday for \$1.5 million on the auction Web site ComicConnect.com. The issue, which features Superman's debut and originally sold for 10 cents, is widely considered the Holy Grail of comic books.

The same issue sold in February for \$1 million, though that copy wasn't in as good condition as the issue that sold Monday.

There are about 100 copies of Action Comics No. 1 believed to be in existence, and only a handful in good condition. The issue that sold Monday had been tucked inside an old movie magazine for years before being discovered.

9 militia members charged in police-killing plot

DETROIT (AP) — Nine suspects tied to a Christian militia that was preparing for the Antichrist were charged with conspiring to kill police officers, then kill scores more by attacking a funeral using homemade bombs, federal prosecutors said Monday.

The Michigan-based group, called Hutaree, planned to use the attack on police as a catalyst for a larger uprising against the government, according to newly unsealed court papers. U.S. Attorney Barbara Mc-Quade said agents moved quickly on the group because its members were planning a violent mission sometime in April.

Members of the group, including its leader, David Brian Stone, were charged following FBI raids over the weekend on locations in Michigan, Ohio and Indiana.

AP source: Kandahar offensive to begin in June

WASHINGTON (AP) — NATO forces in June will make a longplanned assault on the Taliban's spiritual home in the southern Afghan city of Kandahar, a senior military official said Monday.

The goal is to rid the city of Taliban forces before the Muslim holy month of Ramadan begins in August, according to the official.

U.S. officials have previously disclosed plans for a NATO-led offensive in the area this year, but have not said when it might happen. The two-month offensive will be a major test of President Barack Obama's new strategy in Afghanistan and a bellwether of the war in general.

The official, who was not authorized to speak publicly on the operation, discussed the operation on condition of anonymity.






